


Sweat lodges are small, enclosed structures that are heated with hot rocks.

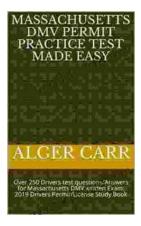

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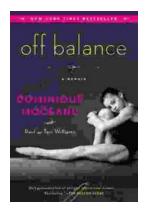
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
